Business MANAGER'S Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We recently finished the 3% allocation that you will receive on June 3, 2019, under the National Pipeline Agreement. All classifications have allocated **30 cents towards healthcare** and the remainder of the raise will be put on your 401(k) benefit contribution. Currently, welders and journeymen on high scale work receive \$6.89 per hour and helpers receive \$3.48 per hour. **With the additional monies, welders and journeymen will receive \$9.30 per hour on 401(k) and helpers will receive \$4.68 per hour on 401(k).**

The work outlook is still very robust, but our enemies are many. Four of our larger projects that should be built this year have enormous opposition. The Atlantic Coast Pipeline and the Mountain Valley Pipeline both started work in 2018 but have more permit problems because of federal agencies being bombarded by lawsuits from anti-pipeline groups. Keystone XL and Enbridge Line 3 will face similar challenges as well. We finished 2018 with a little over 11.9 million man-hours just shy of the 1968 record of 12 million. **We must all continue to utilize the 798 Action Network to advocate for our livelihoods.** I'm proud of what we collectively have been able to accomplish with our voices, but we can do better. We must do better; our enemies are becoming stronger and better financed. **Members tell me all the time that they want to help or serve our Local; there is no better way than to advocate through the Action Network!** Remember, you can write your destiny, or you can let someone else dictate your direction and place in life! I choose to fight!

Steward School 2019 is just around the corner. If you plan to work as a job steward, welder foreman or pipeman, it is imperative that you attend. Company representatives, spreadmen, and office managers from our contractors are also encouraged to attend. Everyone, regardless of classification or job titles, will benefit from the information that will be highlighted. **Also, this year we will have a special 70th Anniversary gift for all attendees and a \$5,000 door prize drawing if you are in attendance for all three days and attend the Regular Membership Meeting!** This is the largest gathering of pipeline constructors in the world. The only way that I can describe this event is to say it is a pipeline family reunion held during the state fair! Good times, good friends, good conversation and a touch of education thrown in. Monday, April 8th, is the Charity Golf Tournament. Tuesday the 9th is the Lincoln BBQ held at the 798 Training Center. On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday until noon, we will be covering our National Pipeline Agreement along with many other issues that affect pipeliners in our industry. Wednesday afternoon, the Ladies of 798 will host their annual charity basket auction, you don't want to miss this special event! Thursday evening, we will honor our 50-plus year members with an evening of dinner and entertainment. Friday at noon, Miller will be hosting our annual Crawfish & Shrimp Boil, also down at the 798 Training Center for all to enjoy.

I look forward to seeing you there and bring a guest along as well. As always, I am proud to say, **"I work for you, the greatest pipeliners in the world."**

Financial **SECRETARY- TREASURER'S** Report

Brothers and Sisters,

We recently held our regular January Membership Meeting here in Tulsa, and I am proud to say that we had well over 300 members in attendance. This was a great turnout for January, with many entering their Union Hall in Tulsa for the very first time. It's always good to see so many members come to take part in the direction of this Local Union. One thing that always stands out to me is the number of retirees that turn out for membership meetings. These guys are the backbone of Local 798 and lived through some of the toughest years in the pipeline industry.

Anyone who attends membership meetings or reads the Blue Light Reports regularly, knows that advocacy has been front and center for the last couple of years. A FERC comment period recently surfaced for Dominion's West Loop Project in Pennsylvania and Ohio, with a very short window to submit comments. Business Manager Danny Hendrix announced at the Friday night membership meeting that the action would be available the next day and urged everyone to take part and share the information. I am proud to report that, even though this action was only available on the Local 798 Action Network over a two-day period, we had 3,700 comments submitted and delivered to FERC in support of this project. Construction of this project is planned for 2020-2021, and Local 798 members have shown the client that we are being proactive by getting out front and fighting for this future work. Thank you to each one of you that are making this a priority.

I want to share some information about our 401(k) plan with you that you might find of interest. Today the market value of Local 798 members' 401(k) plan stands at \$291.2 million. It is amazing how fast this fund had grown since June of 2014, which is when the contractor contribution first began. The market value of the fund at that time was just a little over \$40 million. Now, we have well over 700 members with individual 401(k) account balances between \$100K - \$500K. If you watch your 401(k) balance closely, it is easy to get discouraged with the way the market has been swinging the last few months. The balance will rise and fall, but what's important to remember is that the average rate of return in 401(k) accounts over the last 20 years is around 7%. When the market is volatile, try to remember that you are in this for the long haul and stay the course. If you read many articles about retirement and savings, one thing that is a common theme is that you can never have too much money saved for retirement. Our 401(k) plan, combined with our defined benefit pension plan, ensures that Local 798 members will retire with dignity. With this as just one of the many benefits of belonging to such a great organization, why would anyone want to do the work that we do for less?

It's just about time for Steward School! Please register ahead of time so we can plan accordingly. The 20th Annual Charity Golf Tournament, benefitting the George Lambert/Harry Faucett, Jr. Memorial Scholarship Fund, will be held on Monday, April 8, 2019, at Forest Ridge Golf Course in Broken Arrow, OK. If you are interested in playing in the tournament, you can register as a team, or if you register individually, you will be placed on a team. This is always a fun tournament, and it is for a great cause. The Steward Reporting Computer Class will be held on Tuesday, April 9th, at the Local 798 Training Center, immediately following the Lincoln Electric BBQ. If you've never been, or haven't been in recent years, a few of the highlights are the Retiree Banquet on Thursday evening, the Ladies of 798 Basket Auction on Wednesday evening, the Miller Electric Crawfish Boil, and the Slick Rig Contest. The Steward School session, where we go over the National Pipeline Agreement in its entirety, starts Wednesday, April 10th and continues through noon on Friday, April 12th at the Renaissance Hotel. The week wraps up with our April Regular Membership Meeting on Friday, April 12 at 7 p.m. Please join us!

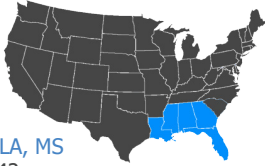

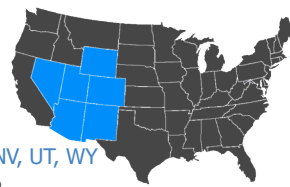

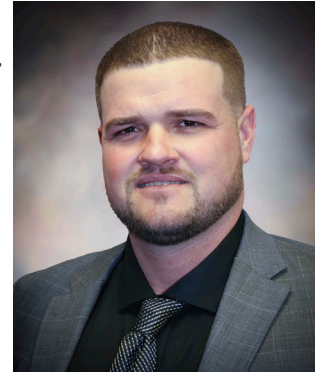

He has been a great friend and mentor over the past 15 years. I was very fortunate to be able to work with Chad during his tenure as Business Agent and learned a lot about how to approach this job. I would also like to thank Brother Danny Hendrix for the opportunity to work for the membership. He has instilled a great amount of trust in me, and I don't intend to let him or the membership down.

Organizing out West is a huge part of this Job. With the work starting to come back out West, my primary focus has been obtaining new contractors. 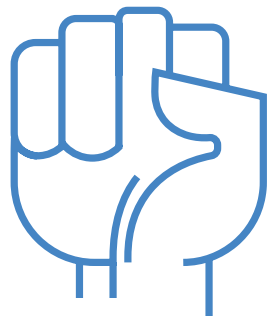
On another note, the work outlook is good out west this year. I am proud to announce that our new contractor, Hanging H, was the successful bidder on the Cheyenne Connector Project for Tallgrass Energy. This project consists of 71 miles of 36-inch pipe in Colorado. Our contractors had to compete with ten different non-union contractors, most of whom turned in automatic and stick rod bids, and Hanging H was successful at the stick rod price. Tallgrass traditionally has not used fair contractors often. However, they do have several larger projects on the books. We need to show them what union labor is all about with our quality and production, which in turn will keep our contractors competitive. The non-union will never match our quality; however, they are getting faster which means we need to step up our game.

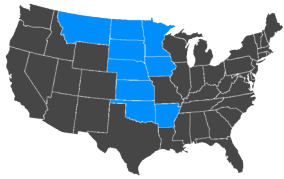
I also look for the maintenance and integrity work to be similar to last year with Michels having most of that work in Colorado. I have been told Michels is on the short list for 35 miles of 12-inch in Wyoming. In addition to that, I have just pre-jobbed three digs in Wyoming with Charps for Enbridge, and I am being told Enbridge may have an additional 100+ digs. If you are not proficient in the uphill welding department, I suggest you utilize the Local 798 Training Center in Tulsa to update your skill sets.

I write this Blue Light report from the Oklahoma City area where the organizers and I have been investigating the non-union contractors that keep the work in Oklahoma. I've had some opportunities to get some of our fair contractors on some of the gas companies bid lists but without much success getting any work. Our union contractors can't compete on this work even using the Special Agreement or Low Scale rates to bid. The non-union contractors use our wage rates with a few dollars off per hour; subtract all the Fringe Benefit rates and pay \$100 per day per diem on seven days. Our contractors can't compete in a market where this happens. A lot of 798 welders are working on these non-union jobs, and you will have charges filed on you when you're found. You're not only cheating this Local and your Brothers and Sisters by helping these contractors get bigger and stronger, but you are cheating yourself and your family out of decent wages and health and welfare benefits. If you don't want to be part of this Union, mail your Union card and a letter of resignation to the Business Manager in Tulsa.

This year will be another great year for 798 members. The Keystone XL should be online sometime around June. I know inspectors that are in MT, SD, and NE now, finishing up the Man Camps, RV Parks, and Pipe Yards they started construction on last year for this project. I've been working on permits for the Keystone XL for the last ten years, and I truly believe it will be laid in 2019 and 2020. Thanks to the leaders of this Local and the UA Pipeline Department, 798 has a PLA (Project Labor Agreement) on the 36-inch main line and all the pump stations.

The Enbridge Line 3 Replacement should be permitted sometime in 2019. There are still some hurdles to get over before this job is permitted, but I am very optimistic for a late 2019 start.

I want to congratulate Chad Gilbert on his appointment to the UA Pipeline Department. This is a giant step for Local 798 and its future. Chad will be missed but not forgotten. Congratulations to Justin Head for being appointed to replace Chad as Business Agent in the western states. In my opinion, Justin was the right guy for the job, and I look forward to working with him in the future.

Don't forget the 2019 Steward School starting the second week in April. As always it will be a good time for you and your family. If you have any questions or concerns about our National Pipeline Agreement, make a list of questions and put it on the floor for discussion so everyone can get on the same page.

Here's to hoping everyone will have a great year. Don't forget, United We Stand, and Divided We Fall.

I have been getting calls from hands asking about going out on non-union jobs as salts. Salting a job will work and has worked, but you must get the job loaded up with over 50 percent of the welders and helpers to be effective. Everyone must have the same intentions, that is to organize the contractor, welders, helpers, and journeymen on the job that are doing our work. A perfect scenario would be for one of our members to get a Welder Foreman slot for a non-union contractor. If you go out there without a salt letter, a plan, and backing from an Organizer or BA, then you are out there being a rat.

I would like to touch base on the work for 2018 and 2019. At one time we were set up to have full employment all winter long, continuing right through the spring. Then permits got pulled, jobs shut down and are delayed. This is one of life's lessons. Don't take anything for granted. Never count your chickens before they hatch, and always have a rainy-day fund "if you are a Pipeliner." Ten short years ago, the rule of thumb was you got laid off in September or October and didn't go back to work until April or May. Being able to work 365 days, day in and day out is pretty much impossible.

There's a good possibility that we will be laying 65 miles of 30-inch in west Texas for Exxon. It looks like they will warehouse in Wink. The line will originate about 45 miles west of Jal, NM, with approximately 14 miles in NM, and end up at the Exxon's tank farm in Wink. This project is scheduled to start around March or early April. If you happen to hire out or dispatch to this job, the cost of living is very high, especially motels. Exxon has some very strict safety rules that we must abide by with no exceptions. We have been trying to acquire work out there for quite a while. This is our opportunity to do what we do best. Our contractors are bidding over 1,000 miles of 42-inch in Texas, and there is twice that much still left to bid on in the next two years.

I want to thank Chad Gilbert for his contribution and dedication to Local 798. When you work beside a friend for over 12 years, you will miss them. Chad will be an asset to the UA Pipe Line Department. Chad, I wish you and Crystal the best. Also, congratulations to Justin Head for his appointment to Business Agent. Danny and Chad have confidence in him, and he has our support.

It's the end of January as I write this report and most of the nation is experiencing historic sub-zero temperatures with negative wind chill factors. It's tough to pipeline in conditions like that. Hopefully, by the time you read this, our 2019 work season, which is projected to be prosperous and plentiful, will be moving in the right direction towards kick-off.

In my area, I currently have status details for three major projects. Price Gregory has been awarded 44 miles of 20", 10" and 6", including fabrication in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan for Semco Gas to go in June. Sources also indicate that 29.4 miles of the Saginaw Trail-Phase 3 for Consumers Energy near Mt. Morris, MI, is scheduled to proceed this spring. My conversations with the project land coordinator for TransCanada's Ohio Buckeye Express project confirm a construction start of Spring 2020.

Despite winter work being slow, January was still productive. I met with the representatives of HDE Pipe Transfer and Mechanical at their main office in Indiana. We had a good visit and a solid discussion highlighting the benefits of using Pipeliners Local Union 798 skilled labor. Perhaps we can look forward to a future partnership. We also had an impressive crowd in Tulsa with a record number in attendance for our January meeting. You are the Union, and the lifeblood of any union is its members, and it requires participation. The best way to stay informed is to take part in membership meetings; especially Steward School. Make your reservations for the week-long event to brush up on the contract and ROW etiquette as well as learn about steward report changes and how to maximize your benefits. Remember though; it's not all work and no play. We'll enjoy the golf tournament, the Lincoln BBQ, the Ladies of 798 basket auction, and the Miller crawfish boil. 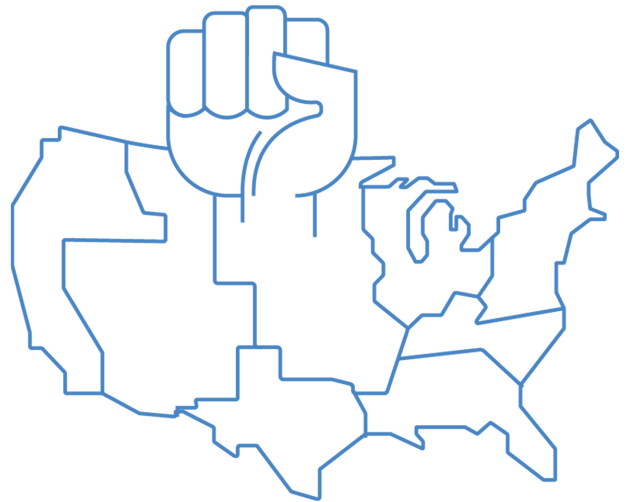

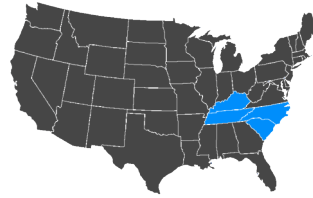

Brothers and Sisters, I hope this report finds everyone doing well. I have been spending most of my time traveling in Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma checking non-union jobs. These non-union jobs represent nothing more than an obstacle between the average working person and the American Dream. Non-union jobs demonstrate control by a small group of people over a much larger group, the working people. These working people are the men and women who only ask for a fair day's pay for a fair day's work. They seek the American Dream of making a livable wage with healthcare and retirement along with the ability to provide for their children.

This is pure greed and nothing more, and they should be ashamed. It disgusts me to see a handful wallow in wealth while the very people who put them there, struggle to buy a new truck or provide for their family without having to work daylight to dark every single day of the year.

We are truly blessed to work for fair contractors that believe their employees should also be well compensated for their hard work. We owe these good contractors a day's work for a day's pay, and we must be the most productive and highly skilled craftsmen in the world. The non-union side keeps their employees living from paycheck to paycheck and fearing every rumor of a layoff, always reaching for empty promises that never will be fulfilled.

There is only one hope for the non-union worker, and that is to organize. These unfair companies will never pay them what they deserve willingly. The other is the various determined groups that will stop at nothing to see that pipelines are a thing of the past. These groups have one agenda, and that is to destroy our way of life. It is imperative that we have 110% participation in our Action Network. Please, if you do nothing else, join the Action Network. Encourage your friends and your family members to join. Take action every time you are called on because you can be assured that our opposition will.

By the time you receive this, Steward School will be right around the corner. Make every effort to attend. Not only is it very educational but a lot of fun as well.

I would like to thank all the men and women who have called with information about the non-union activity. Each one of you is the backbone of this Local Union. If I can help anyone in any way, please call. Also, if you have any information that can help our efforts, pick that phone up. It's not possible for me to be everywhere at once or see and hear everything. But with your help, we can see and hear all.

Here in dispatch, we will call anywhere that you think you have a lead on work. We are happy to follow up with a bio if it looks like it will get our member's a job.

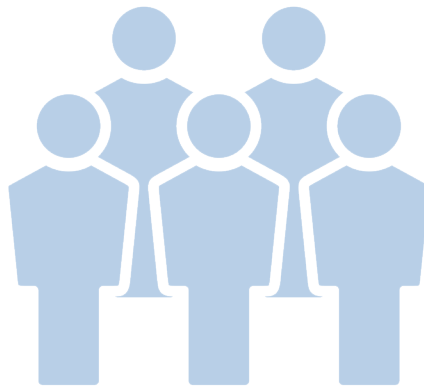

New Pension Tax Table Installed

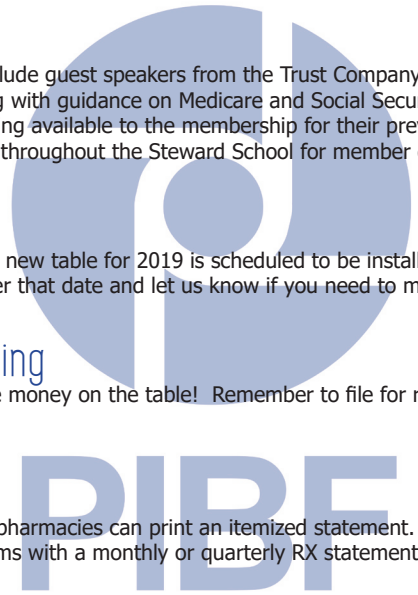
