Business Manager's Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I would first like to say, "Tough times never last. But tough people do." Pipeliners are some of the toughest and most resilient folks, but we are definitely being tested. We already had many enemies to battle, such as cheap nonunion contractors, biased judges, and extreme environmental protesters. Now we have to include COVID-19, a drastic stock market drop, and two nations, Russia and Saudi Arabia, flooding the world market with oil to try and kill America's energy producers. Thank goodness members of OPEC and its allies agreed to slash oil output by nearly 10 million barrels a day, which should return oil prices to around \$40 a barrel. This is still relatively low but much better for American producers. COVID-19 has done one thing positive, and it has kept large environmental protest groups at home and out of the headlines. I've been in the pipeline industry for 43 years, and I have seen it much worse but for different reasons. If you have been a member of 798 since the early 80s, I don't have to explain it any further. We are joined at the hip with the oil and gas industry, which is infamously known as a boom or bust industry since its inception. It typically is never a full-time job except during the boom, and just when you think the sun will never quit shining, the bust comes along and brings nothing but grey skies with rain.

Ironically, I believe that COVID-19 has a chance to teach Americans several valuable lessons for maintaining life, liberty, and the continued pursuit of happiness. First and foremost, we need to move our manufacturing back to America for all products, but specifically our pharmaceuticals. Making prescription medications in China is nothing but pure corporate greed utilizing some of the cheapest labor on the planet for corporate profits. Buy American, and we don't need to continue to outsource America's wealth to any foreign country. Second, historically every nation on this Earth that was the superpower of its day had one thing in common, abundant domestically produced energy. America has the coveted position of the superpower of the world. Still, several nations and one national political party are doing their best to destroy that strength that separates us from the rest of the world. Fortunately, we have pipeline work to do before the build-out is complete from several years of agonizing permit problems.

Negotiations for our National Pipeline Agreement are continuing, and hopefully, by June 1st, this issue will be resolved, and all parties satisfied with the outcome. The work is still just crawling along mostly due to the problems of how to handle social distancing, quarantine guidelines, and still get a pipeline built at the same time. Most, if not all, jobs require a series of questions pertaining to COVID-19 and are taking the temperature of all workers before employment. Some clients and contractors are taking temperatures daily as a precaution.

Keystone XL should be finished with the border crossing by the time you receive this publication. KXL plans to move forward with spreads in Montana and Nebraska, with the remaining spreads being constructed in 2021. Enbridge Line 3 still looks good for this year along with the Atlantic Coast and the completion of the Mountain Valley. Thousands of miles of pipe are currently being bid down south under the Market Recovery rates. We have limited success, but the awards are still pending on numerous large projects. Just as last year, the lion's share of our man-hours will be smaller jobs and smaller pipe. It may not be as sexy as working on a big spread, but many times it opens opportunities for our members to showcase their skillsets instead of just doing one task over and over.

Last but certainly not least, we need to push our advocacy harder than ever. At this moment, we have a distinct advantage over the protesters, as they will not be making any headlines. At the same time, we continue to collectively use our voices to push ahead for the pipeline industry. I want to try to convey in words with all sincerity, that I understand many of you have been without work for way longer than anyone expected, and I wish we had a record-setting year, every year. But the truth is that the boom we've experienced since 2007 lasted ten years longer than anyone ever expected. With that being said, the work outlook is still strong. But be cautious, our enemies against pipelines are many, and we must continue to push our agenda utilizing the Action Network.

As always, I am proud to say, "***I work for you, the greatest pipeliners in the world.***"

I pray that this trend continues. These are unprecedented times in which we are living. The stock market is swinging wildly, and the price of oil is bouncing lower many days. I hope that this pandemic subsides soon, and the after-effects on the economy are not as dire as some predict. I believe we will come out of this stronger than before, given time.

Even with all of this going on, I am continuing to see job notifications come in, and some are for large projects. This is definitely a good sign of things on the horizon. I know many of our members are hurting right now with the slower work situation, and hopefully, as quickly as the country opens back up, we will be back on the right-of-way. Please continue to check the Action Network for any available opportunities to advocate for our work. The beauty of this is that we can still take actions supporting our industry, even while confined to our homes. Things are looking up for the Line 3 replacement and the Keystone XL. Abercrombie is currently putting in the 1.2 miles of pipe for the KXL border crossing between the U.S. and Canada. Sometime in the next month or so, we should get a ruling from the U.S. Supreme Court on the Atlantic Coast Pipeline. The news coverage of the hearings all sounded like we would get a favorable ruling, but we will know for sure soon. There is also a good portion of the MVP to be completed as well.

We've got the work, and we need the politicians to get out of the way of progress. If you follow national politics at all, you can see that pipelines are a hot button issue right now. One party constantly kowtows to the far-left rabid environmentalists, and really for the first election cycle in history, they come right out and say they will stop new pipeline projects. Both times that Obama ran, he stayed somewhat neutral or even positive towards the Keystone XL. Still, once elected, he proved that he wasn't willing to go to bat for good union construction jobs against the activists that want to see our way of life destroyed. 

I hope this report finds everybody and their families in good health. At the moment, it is hard to grasp what's happening in the world. However, we are 798 members and Americans. We are and have always been the most resilient group of people in the world. We will come out on top of this!

With that being said, I would like to begin this report by welcoming W.A. Rasic as a signatory contractor. I thank Jimmy Slavens and Mark Witt for their help to get me in touch with the right people to make this possible. W.A. Rasic is based in California. However, they currently have some work in Nevada and are always looking at more work in my jurisdiction. It seems like Kinder Morgan is set to do a fair amount of work on their Co2 and liquids side, but the COVID-19 pandemic has pushed back some of these pre-jobs. Hanging H was awarded

a job for Kinder Morgan in New Mexico, and it has been pushed back as well. I've had a fair amount of calls asking what the work is going to be like out west this year. Before March, I was optimistic it was going to be better than last year, but to be honest, now I cannot say it will. The price of oil is definitely taking a toll on the work out west. Denbury had some work in Montana scheduled and awarded and was planning to put some 24" in Wyoming out for bid, but with oil being low and Co2 being used primarily to extract oil, both of those projects will be delayed until it is profitable again. Q & D has some work that has been awarded to them, but it sounds as if those projects may be on hold until it is safer to go to work.

Most of the natural gas projects are still moving forward. There has been quite a bit of large diameter pipe going in New Mexico and West Texas this year that I have been monitoring over the last year. I believe our fair contractors should have the opportunity to compete on that work.

The year 2020 will long be remembered for the pain and misery that the Coronavirus has caused the world. The KXL Pipeline is ready to blast off this work season and go until the fall of 2021. Abercrombie has 1.5 miles of KXL 36" border crossing in Montana underway, and it will be complete by the time this Blue Light is mailed out. The virus is the problem now. We have a lot to learn about how we staff these jobs, keep everyone safe, and still get the pipe laid and in the ground. Every client and contractor has their own ideas and rules on how to keep their employees safe and stay working.

Did you ever think such a situation would occur in our lifetime? We've always heard the advice to save for a rainy day or work slowdown, but not save for a pandemic. Please try to help your Welder Foreman and Job Steward ensure a safe and healthy work environment by taking precautions not only on the job but also at home and in public. Stay healthy and practice good hygiene daily. This could be the difference in jobs shutting down or projects up and running. Contractors will implement precautionary measures to keep our members and the entire union workforce healthy with masks, social distancing, clean buses, clean porta-johns, hand sanitizers, etc. If preventative measures are not exercised, use your chain of command; Welder Foreman first, Job Steward second, and then the Business Agent. We all must pull together just as the nation has.

As everyone is aware, COVID-19 is currently issue number one in our country. It has affected our homes, our industry, and our normal way of life. Most of the calls I've been receiving take a turn towards the Coronavirus and how it affects the 2020 work outlook. The virus has affected the work in the Northeast in many ways, and there are future scenarios none of us can see at this time.

I currently have one job in Pennsylvania that has shut down and three other jobs that were shut down for a while but were allowed to go back with smaller crews to do essential work. Other jobs have shut down due to the news of employees on the project who tested positive for COVID-19. The Shell Ethane Cracker, which employed a large number of Local 798 members, has also shut down. Some projects are trying to stay small and not hire new employees until the virus numbers turn toward the decline.

Most conversations also turn to the large projects that were supposed to start moving in the spring. I haven't heard anything new on the Mountain Valley Pipeline start date. After attending Senate and House of Representative hearings this winter with EQT representatives, the talk was about MVP being hopeful of getting preliminary work done in April. I speculate that due to COVID-19, the MVP will go but will be delayed due to the logistics of onboarding large groups when the project is already under a microscope. The United States Fish and Wildlife Service has asked for a 30-day extension on their MVP project impact review related to fish and bats, which will also affect the start date.

The Atlantic Coast Pipeline remains tied up in the Supreme Court of the United States, and the ruling was supposed to be handed down in June. I'm unsure if the virus will change the ruling timeline, but I'm sure it's a possibility. I continue to pre-job small, "essential" jobs that will provide work to some. Hopefully, we can put this pandemic behind us and return to normal sometime soon. For now, it is imperative that we follow CDC guidelines, practice social distancing, and, last but certainly not least, take care of our families during these unprecedented times. Please stay safe, stay healthy, and stay positive while we weather this storm.

PIBF Report

Virtual Medical Visit option available May 1st

PIBF will be launching the MDLIVE program on May 1, 2020. This is a virtual medical visit program offered by BlueCross BlueShield for active and COBRA participants and for participants where PIBF is the primary coverage. This program will give 24/7/365 access to speak to a doctor from any location. Co-payment for this service will be \$15 per visit. This co-payment will not count toward your annual medical benefits deductible or out-of-pocket expense limit. It will be eligible for reimbursement under the Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA) by submitting your Explanation of Benefits (EOB) with a completed HRA Claim Form. Details about the program and instructions on how to participate have been mailed to the membership. In addition, a new Medical ID card listing the MDLIVE information will be mailed to you soon. Please know that MDLIVE is experiencing high visit volumes due to COVID-19 and the cold and flu season and wait times may be longer than normal.

Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA)

The HRA filing deadline for the 2019 plan year has been extended on a one-time basis from April 15, 2020, to July 15, 2020.

Pipeline Industry 401(k) Plan Changes

- Effective April 1, 2020, the six-month separation distribution option has been reduced to a three-month separation distribution. As of April 1, 2020, if you have not worked in three months or more, you are eligible to take a distribution upon completion of applicable documentation. Distributions under this provision are still limited to 2 per lifetime. The requirement to withhold Federal and State taxes remains in effect and distributions continue to be subject to the 10% early withdrawal penalty if you are under age 59½.
- Effective January 1, 2020, the age to commence Required Minimum Distributions has increased from age 70½ to 72.
- Effective January 1, 2020, the age for an In-Service Distribution is reduced from age 62 to 59½. This distribution is available for participants who are working and not yet retired. The requirement to withhold Federal and State taxes remains in effect. Distributions under this provision are still limited to 1 per year.
- Effective April 1, 2020, through March 31, 2021, the amount available to a participant for a Hardship Distribution shall be expanded from Employee contributions only to include QNEC/Employer Contributions and earnings on Employee and QNEC/Employer contributions. Beginning April 1, 2021, the amount available for a Hardship Distribution will be from Employee contributions only.
- Effective January 1, 2020, an additional Hardship Distribution option has been added under The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES). This option provides that payments qualifying as a "coronavirus-related distribution" (CRD) are exempt from the 10% excise tax for early distributions. This is available for up to \$100,000 in aggregate across all retirement accounts, limited to the amount available for a Hardship Distribution (see Item 4 above), and must be made during the period January 1, 2020, to before December 31, 2020, to the following "qualified individuals":
 - Individuals diagnosed with SARS-COV-2 or Coronavirus 2019 ("COVID-19") by a test approved by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention,
 - Individuals whose spouse or dependent (as defined by IRC §152) is so diagnosed, or
 - Individuals who experience adverse financial consequences as a result of being quarantined, furloughed or laid off or having work hours reduced due to COVID-19, being unable to work due to lack of child care due to COVID-19, closing or reducing hours of a business owned or operated by the individual due to COVID-19, or other factors as may be determined by the Secretary of the Treasury (or the Secretary's delegate).

If you apply for a distribution under this option, you will be required to certify in writing that you satisfy the requirements for a CRD. The CRD may be repaid in one or more payments at any time during the three-year period beginning on the day after the date the distribution was made, to any eligible retirement plan to which you could make a rollover contribution. The repayments will be limited to the amount of the CRD.

As previously mentioned, the CRD will not be subject to the 10% early distribution tax and may be included in income ratably over a three-year period, unless you elect otherwise. The CRD is not eligible for direct rollover and would not be subject to automatic 20% tax withholding.

- Plan participants who otherwise would be required to take a minimum required distribution in calendar year 2020 can elect to suspend that distribution for 2020.
- Effective January 1, 2020, an additional Hardship Distribution option has been added to allow a distribution for expenses and losses (including loss of income) incurred by the participant on account of a disaster declared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, Public Law 100-707, provided that the participant's principal residence or principal place of employment at the time of the disaster was located in an area designated by FEMA for individual assistance with respect to the disaster.

Disabled Dependents

If your dependent child is due to terminate coverage at age 26 and is disabled, you can request to have their coverage extended. If the child is both (a) incapable of self-sustaining employment by reason of mental deficiency or physical handicap, and (b) primarily dependent on you for support and maintenance, you must provide proof of such incapacity and dependency within 31 days of the child's attainment of age 26. The coverage will continue as long as the incapacity and dependency continue. The Board of Trustees may require proof of the child's continuing disability and dependency as often as it deems necessary. Existing plan eligibility rules apply.

Weekly Disability Benefits

The short-term disability benefit is payable as described in the PIBF Health and Welfare Plan Benefits Summary Plan Description (SPD) if you become Totally Disabled because of an accident or illness which occurs while actively covered by the Plan. To receive benefits, written notice of Total Disability must be submitted to PIBF within 180 days of the first day of disability. Continuation of benefits is not automatic. At a minimum, you must submit bi-weekly disability forms, which your Doctor of Medicine (M.D.) or Doctor of Osteopathy (D.O.) has completed. You are "Totally Disabled" when you are unable to perform any type of work because of injury or illness. However, the plan has exclusions listed in the SPD which can be found on our website at www.pibf.org or you may also contact the Fund office for this information. If you qualify, you may receive a weekly \$250 disability benefit for a maximum period of 26 weeks per disability. You can receive this benefit in addition to any workman's compensation benefits you may be receiving; however, you cannot receive these benefits if you are retired under PIPF or covered under the PIBF COBRA program. You also cannot receive weekly disability benefits and unemployment benefits at the same time.

Divorce Decrees and related documents must be sent to PIBF

PIBF requires a copy of your Divorce Decree when it is finalized. This must be received so that your ex-spouse can be removed as a dependent. Members must reimburse PIBF for any claims incurred after the date of your divorce. In addition, you should submit copies of any Separation Agreement, Settlement Agreement or other related documents to the PIBF for review. All documents submitted should be signed by all parties and show proof of filing with the court. These must be reviewed prior to a 401(k) distribution or retirement from PIPF. Submitting these documents as soon as possible saves the trouble of having to locate these documents later.

UA Dues Relief Program

In an effort to help members financially during the global pandemic, the U.A. has imposed a dues relief program.

For the month of April 2020, and thereafter on a month-to-month basis at the direction and discretion of U.A. General President Mark McManus and General Secretary-Treasurer Pat Kellett, Local Unions shall cover the fixed monthly dues (i.e., window dues) of all non-retired members who performed 40 or fewer hours of UA work in the previous calendar month. For example, if a member performed only 32 hours of UA work in March, his or her monthly dues for April shall be covered by the Local Union. Non-retired members who performed over 40 hours of UA work in the previous calendar month, and members who are legitimately retired, shall not be eligible for relief the following month. The relief provided by this paragraph shall not apply to working assessments, which may continue to be applied to any and all hours worked pursuant to the By-Laws or other rules of the Local Union. To the extent a member who is eligible for the relief provided by this paragraph has already paid his or her monthly dues to the Local Union for April (or for any other month in which the relief is provided), such payment shall be applied to the member's future dues obligations.

Enforcement of Sections 157-158 of the UA Constitution—which impose automatic suspension/loss of good standing and a \$50.00 reinstatement fee, on any member owing more than three months' dues shall be on hold until such time as General President McManus and General Secretary-Treasurer Kellett determine that enforcement of these sections should resume. Government orders and guidance to close offices, stay home, and take other actions have created significant logistical obstacles to the timely receipt and processing of dues payments. These obstacles, in turn, have made it difficult to fairly and consistently enforce the suspension threshold against members. Instead, the member will be treated as being in good standing until he or she reaches the threshold for expulsion set forth in Section 159. Expulsions, which require a full six months in arrears for dues, do not raise the same level of concern as suspensions and, therefore, will continue to be processed.

The Local Union office will automatically apply credits to eligible members, so no action is required by the member. Please be patient as we make modifications to our software and current dues processes to accommodate these changes.

How to Protect Yourself and Others from COVID-19

Know how it spreads



- There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- **The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.**
- The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person.
 - » Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
 - » Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks.
 - » These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.
 - » Some recent studies have suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.

Everyone should

Clean your hands often



- **Wash your hands** often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, **use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.** Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- **Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth** with unwashed hands.

Avoid close contact



- **Avoid close contact** with people who are sick.
- **Stay at home as much as possible.**
- **Put distance between yourself and other people.**
 - » Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.
 - » This is especially important for **people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.** <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/need-extra-precautions/people-at-higher-risk.html>

Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others



- **You could spread COVID-19 to others** even if you do not feel sick.
- **Everyone should wear a cloth face cover when they have to go out in public,** for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities.
 - » Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

- **The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people** in case you are infected.
- Do **NOT** use a facemask meant for a healthcare worker.
- Continue to **keep about 6 feet between yourself and others**. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.

Cover coughs and sneezes



- **If you are in a private setting and do not have on your cloth face covering, remember to always cover your mouth and nose** with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
- **Throw used tissues** in the trash.
- Immediately **wash your hands** with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

Clean and disinfect



- **Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces** daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks. <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/disinfecting-your-home.html>
- **If surfaces are dirty, clean them:** Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.
