Business Manager's Report

Raymond is well-known for running his business professionally and will be a great addition to the committee. I'd also like to thank Jason Knight for his time on the Finance Committee. Jason resigned recently to be able to focus on his successful business. I enjoyed working with Jason, and I wish he and his family nothing but continued success with their business endeavors. A big "congratulations" goes out to Preston "The Prez" Richard as well. Preston served as president of Local 798 for many terms and was always nothing short of professional at running a membership meeting. Congratulations to Shannon Jackson on stepping up to take on this great responsibility. It is no easy task, but Shannon is ready, as he showed at the January Membership Meeting. Finally, congratulations to Phillip Razian for being appointed to fill the role of inside guard. Jimmy and Ricky are working hard to get members out to work in other local unions' jurisdictions. The orbital welding process will open up many employment opportunities for our membership. Reach out to the Dispatch office to see what certifications will make you the most employable. Farron and the instructors at the Training Center will work with you to get you the certifications required for this work.

Steward School is almost here. By the time you read this report, registrations will have gone out. We'd like to see you here in Tulsa if you are able. It's been strange not having a Steward School the last couple of years, so it'll be nice to get back on track. We will go through the contract in the business sessions, have some good speakers to listen to, enjoy good food and fellowship, celebrate retirees with 50+ years of membership, and help the Ladies of 798 raise money for their worthy charities. This year, in place of the Steward Reporting class, we have decided to reserve that time for anyone that needs specific one-on-one guidance on the steward reporting forms. There will be no presentation, but we will have staff available to sit with you and help you with anything you may be having trouble with. Each of these videos is relevant and a great tool for brushing up or learning the process from start to finish. If you need help or want to learn the process for the first time, come by, and we will work with you.

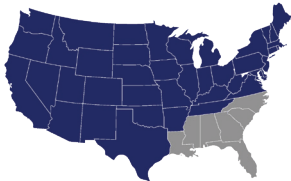

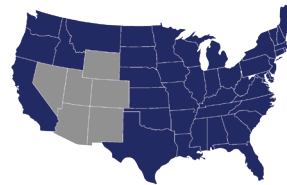

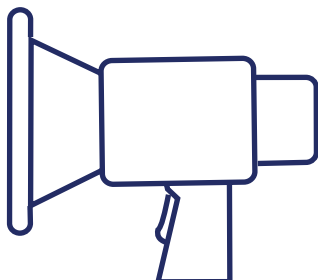

Tallgrass Energy plans to lay down a 24" line to Cushing, Oklahoma, which is likely to start next year. It is still relatively slow, but rig counts are going back up daily. I am hopeful that will sprout more opportunities soon.

I want to start my report by recognizing those I failed to mention in my previous report. David Barnett's retirement is bittersweet for me. His dedication and love for Local 798 and the United Association are unmatched. Through the years, I have looked to Dave for guidance and strength many times, and he was always there with a consistent and patient attitude that all will sorely miss. I wish him luck and pray that he and Nicole are blessed in the future as they finally get to enjoy life.

I would also like to mention the appointments of Jimmy Dick, Todd Hartle, and Raymond Johnson. I have worked with each of these men throughout the years, and I can unequivocally say that I know they will be an asset in building the future of Local 798. Phillip Razian was appointed to inside guard at the January Membership Meeting, and although we have never worked together, I look forward to getting to know him and working with him in the future.

The Mountain Valley Pipeline looks to be delayed due to two recent Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals rulings. The first tossed permit is the Jefferson National Forest permit which the Bureau of Land Management grants. The second permit tossed is the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's review of the project being allowed to drill and open-cut streams along the pipeline route. The Fourth Circuit feels that more study is needed regarding the harm of two endangered fish species (Roanoke Logperch and Candy Darter). Both permits will need to be reworked to satisfy the court, which leaves the project in a current limbo state.

Until these permits were remanded, we felt encouraged that the project would be manning up in mid-February, but now I think we need to pivot and look toward other work opportunities in 2022. I feel that the maintenance and the small work will be similar to last year, and I am also hearing that the building trades work will be strong. If you want to work building trades this year, please don't hesitate to contact me or the Dispatch office. We are currently working hard to make sure that we will have a seat at the table when this work breaks. I ask that you work hard to represent yourself in a way that will make these locals want to make us their first call when they hire travelers. We can do this. We just need to be humble, honest, hard-working, and try to be the best in everything we do, whether in our local or in another.

UA Scholarship

We are pleased to announce that the United Association Scholarship Trust Fund is gearing up for the 2022-2023 academic year scholarship awards. Generally, dependents of UA members who are pursuing a post-high school education at an accredited college or university may apply for a scholarship (please see eligibility requirements and award criteria in the detailed instructions found with the application). ***The deadline for submitting applications is June 9, 2022.***

Applications are exclusively accepted electronically through uascholarshipfund.communityforce.com. Potential applicants should check that website beginning February 25 for additional instructions to access and submit applications for the 2022-2023 academic year.

Up to 112 scholarships totaling as much as \$222,000 will be awarded this year, including 106 for students pursuing undergraduate studies and up to six for students pursuing graduate studies. Scholarships range from \$1,500 to \$5,000 each.

The three most important considerations in determining who receives a UA Scholarship are the applicant's academic standing, personal achievements, and community participation. However, financial consideration may also be taken into account in situations of a "tie-breaker." In addition, six scholarships will be given to applicants who demonstrate they want another chance at an education to advance their potential for higher-paying employment.

Some information requested in the application process and other application requirements include:

- ◇ The applicant must be planning or already attending post-high school education at an institution of higher learning for the Fall 2022 semester.
- ◇ Applicant must have completed or be about to complete high school or be a college student.
- ◇ Applicant must have been accepted for admission or be enrolled in an accredited college or university. Enrollment certification will be required prior to scholarship funds being disbursed to the successful applicant.
- ◇ A personal statement of 500 words or less is required. The applicant has a choice of the topics listed in the application.
- ◇ Two letters of recommendation or reference letters are required to be submitted directly by the reference. One of these letters must be from a teacher or individual who is in a position to evaluate the applicant's academic performance.
- ◇ The most recent official transcript of the student must be submitted.

DISPATCH Report

In Dispatch, Jimmy Dick and I have constantly been soliciting work through UA locals throughout the United States. There is a demand for combo welders in several locations, predominantly nuclear work, and some refineries. We have gotten a few members on some high-rise work in the Northeast. Lately, we have had the opportunity to offer some work to our Helpers interested in working in building trades. However, the requirements consist of some written quizzes, more testing, and in-depth background checks.

There are some basic requirements for gaining employment in the building trades side. Most locals require an OSHA 10 card or certificate to get on their projects. It has become standard. Members also need UA certifications to increase the opportunity to get on these jobs. The minimum is an uphill 6010 stick bead with fill and cap low hydrogen, followed by Heliarc bead and hot pass, and then fill and cap with low hydrogen. Additionally, you need a stainless Heliarc test all the way out and finally a 6-inch downhill on a 45. All of these tests have to be done in a UA local union facility. They cannot be done on a job. Some days we have jobs, but no one meets the necessary requirements. By the time other locals reach out to us, they are running out of time and need people immediately. Continuity can be updated from a job with proper paperwork. So once you get the certs, keep them updated.

We utilize all of the tools at our disposal to communicate and facilitate connecting these jobs with our members. We reach out with phone calls, word of mouth, call blasts, emails, and spreadsheets. Our goal is the betterment of the UA and our Local 798 members.

Sav-Rx Patient Portal

Sav-Rx is the new Pharmacy Benefit Manager for PIBF as of January 1, 2022. They provide a secure patient portal that allows you to download and see an ID card, refill mail-order prescriptions, track mail-order shipments, see retail and mail-order claims, and download claims history. Visit app.savrx.com to register. Please note that the refill function on the portal will not be operational if you have not filled your first mail-order with Sav-Rx. You must request a fill by phone at 1-800-228-3108 to utilize refills transferred over from the CVS mail-order pharmacy. After that is processed, you may utilize the portal for future mail-order refills.

Tax Forms Available on Member Portal

Tax forms 1099R (Pension Payments) and 1095B (Health Coverage) were mailed to you at the end of January. These forms are also available on the member portal at www.pibf.org. Log in and click on the "General Information" tab and then "Fund Office Correspondence." A list of correspondence will display, and you can select and print the forms.

New Pension Tax Table Installed

Pension tax tables are updated in the first quarter each year. The new table for 2022 is scheduled to be installed effective March 1, 2022. Please review your deposit amount as of that date and after and let us know if you need to make any changes.

Annual Pension Statements

Annual Pension statements are scheduled to be mailed to participants in March. Please verify pension hours worked for the current year and check the beginning year showing on your statement. This is especially important for older years to make sure your pension statement is complete.

Quarterly 401(k) Statements

Statements from the Trust Company of Oklahoma are mailed quarterly. When you receive your statement, it is important to verify that your 401(k) contributions, including Employee and Employer contributions (QNEC), are properly included.

The HRA deadline is fast approaching for 2021 claims. Don't leave money on the table! Remember to file for reimbursement of your 2021 claims by April 15, 2022. 7 Healthy Habits for the New Year and the Secrets to Making them Stick

It's the New Year – get ready for a new you! The most common New Year's resolution is to get healthier. And the New Year is a perfect time to make changes and plan for a brighter future. So, why do only 12% of people achieve their New Year's goals? The secret to developing a healthy habit lies in implementing small steps that are positive, specific, and achievable. Instead of setting another goal, here are 7 healthy New Year's habits and the secrets to achieving them beyond January 2nd:



1. Start your day with a tall glass of water.

You're already dehydrated when you wake up in the morning, so drinking water, broth, or herbal tea will help energize you, improve your complexion, and help regulate your blood pressure. An easy way to remember if you're getting enough water is to drink half your body weight in ounces. For example, if you weigh 150 lbs., you should drink at least 75 ounces each day. Make it easier by keeping water by your bedside as a reminder. Set a daily alert or app and sip water from a reusable bottle throughout the day.

5. Make a doctor's appointment, even if you think you're fine.

Regular doctor visits keep you healthier. Visit your doctor for wellness screenings and routine care, which can spot potential health problems before they become more serious and costly. For more urgent needs like colds, flu, rashes, or pink eye, make it easy to get fast care by downloading the MDLIVE app and creating a free account. Talk to a doctor in 15 minutes or less for more than 80 common conditions.



6. Wash your drinking cup and coffee mug every day.

Replacing or cleaning those items you use every day helps prevent the spread of harmful bacteria and viruses. In particular, anything that stays wet, including shower towels, toothbrushes, and water cups, may have more germs than you realize. Keep items clean by hanging your shower towels so they are spread out – not folded or hanging from a hook – to completely dry after each use. Replace after 2-3 uses. If you've been sick, quarantine your toothbrush so it doesn't spread germs to other toothbrushes nearby, and replace it afterward.
