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

Business Manager's Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Spring is right around the corner, and with it comes work opportunities that we all need. We expect that the pipeline work will continue to pick up. Still, many would love to see us abandon our promotional efforts to build the infrastructure of American power and energy independence. Misguided efforts to ban the use of natural gas, defund the infrastructure that transports it, and block permits for new interstate pipelines will have real-life consequences in just a few years as supplies become constrained in many states. Economic development will suffer, and consumers who can least afford it will be left with higher-cost alternatives. America should be learning from Europe's mistakes, not repeating them. European countries hastily moved away from domestic coal, and nuclear baseload generation in favor of still-unreliable renewable sourced energy, which left them vulnerable and reliant on energy imports. The Russia-Ukraine war exacerbated the problem as Russia cut off natural gas supplies, which were already unpredictable, hoping to reverse economic sanctions. Now, amid the crisis, some European countries are scrambling to revive coal plants, return to investments in nuclear power and lift moratoriums on natural gas retrieval.

American people, especially elected politicians, need to research the real data of the carbon footprint of all types of energy based on "birth to death" on a unified unit of measurement. Additionally, calculate a cost analysis that an average household will sustain before demanding that every household and business MUST switch to an energy supply that is more expensive, intermittent, and mostly unavailable to the masses. According to industry experts, solar panels and wind turbines (including EVs), primarily manufactured in China, will wear out and need to be replaced prior to ever achieving net zero emissions if you calculate the materials and energy used to manufacture and construct the networks.

Carbon capture pipelines and hydrogen utilization are the new offshoots of the energy industry that are desperately trying to validate the needs of both to clean up their part and the industries of others so that the end product is abundant, affordable, and homegrown. Ironically, the group of people they so desperately are trying to impress are staunchly against carbon sequestration. Not because it will clean up the life cycle of the energy unit but because the sequestration process helps facilitate the ongoing dependence and use of fossil fuels into the future. No matter how much you clean it up, how abundant, and no matter that it is homegrown, the decision-makers of America believe that the time has come to kill fossil fuels. Even if the alternative is worse because solar or wind-generated electricity is primarily unavailable, unaffordable, and does not have zero emissions when the materials and energy for manufacturing and construction are in the final footprint calculation. America is at a tipping point on almost every issue in this country. Hopefully, we can collectively slow down the rhetoric and focus on the real issues that need to be addressed. One of the main stumbling blocks for our industry is we need real permit reform, and we need it NOW. Why should any industry wait five or ten years or longer for approval for any project? We don't need more people on the government payroll. We need people to do their jobs. Have you ever heard of the government laying off anybody? Of course not. They hire or appoint another committee.

Steward School is quickly approaching, and I hope you can make plans to attend. Please let us know by registering so that we may better serve you. We are moving forward with organizing efforts against unscrupulous contractors that continue to operate as Robber Barons, paying workers a substandard wage with little or no benefits while enjoying a lavish lifestyle paid for with the sweat of unappreciated craftsmen. Much more to be said about this at our regular meeting. We are also planning to schedule regional informational meetings in a jurisdictional location near you very soon.

As always, I am proud to say, "I work for you, the greatest pipeliners in the world."

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I want to thank each of you who have taken recent actions in the Action Network. We've had productive meetings lately with client gas companies in several areas of our jurisdiction. We think these partnerships will bear fruit for Local 798 in the near future. Part of a presentation we've put together for these gas companies includes data showing the number of signatures we can gather and our ability to call on the membership to show up in person at public meetings to help along the permit process for their projects. If you question whether this advocacy works, you might be surprised to learn that the nonunion contractors are trying to mirror what we are doing on this front. They are basically using an Action Network type format to advocate against anything that might force them to pay a competitive wage. A recent action they ran was to oppose project labor agreements on federal construction projects. This proves that we must step up our participation for every action we run. As Thomas Donahue said, "The only effective answer to organized greed is organized labor."

Steward School is just around the corner. If you plan to work in the future as a steward, welder foreman, or pipeman, please plan to attend. The week will kick off with the 22nd Annual George Lambert/Harry Faucett, Jr. Memorial Scholarship Golf Tournament at Forest Ridge Golf Course on Monday, April 10. On Tuesday, April 11, representatives from the UA Organizing Department will be on hand to give the COMET Presentation immediately following the barbecue at the Training Center. This is the "Construction Organizing Membership Education Training" that covers the history of building trades membership, why we need to organize, how we need to organize, and how to get the membership involved in organizing. This will take place in the time slot we usually have the steward reporting forms class.

The steward reporting process has remained the same, and keep in mind we have a whole series of videos to walk you through the reporting process on the website. However, if you need any assistance with the reports, please email me at jwallace@local798.org, and we will accommodate you with one-on-one help during the week. We plan major changes to the reporting process in the next year, so expect an entire session covering those changes in April 2024.

Also, during the week, we will have the Lincoln Electric Barbecue, Miller Electric Crawfish Boil, Ladies of 798 Basket Auction, and our standard contract sessions. It will all wrap up with the regular April Membership Meeting on Friday, April 14. We hope to see you there.

It's once again that time of year! Steward School is just around the corner. If you plan on stewarding or being a welder foreman, please make plans to attend. I believe there will be a bit of a format change and some additions that will make it more interesting and informative this year. If you are working in building trades and would like to participate, please give the locals and the contractors plenty of heads up. It usually isn't a problem.

Some work in my area is starting to take shape. Kinder Morgan has received permits for some of the integrity work in Arizona, and it appears there is quite a bit more to do this year. A lot of integrity work was pushed back last year, and I hope most clients will have to do last year's work and this year's. On another note, it appears WHC was the successful bidder on the Kern River work in Utah. I am still working on finding out why. Kern River has generally preferred skilled, trained labor on their larger work. I can only speculate what has changed. What is frustrating is that we sent around 2,500 letters to FERC advocating for that project. As frustrating as it is, we must still create partnerships with our advocation, amongst other means. We are still awaiting awards for the Tallgrass work coming from Colorado into Oklahoma. Again, there is much speculation and rumors about what is holding up the award process. As I mentioned in my last report, I still expect some of the work in Nevada to get going this year. There are at least two 20-30 mile projects in the planning phase, and I feel optimistic that we will have the opportunity to compete for those jobs. I have also been kicking some station work in Wyoming to the contractors that perform that work, and I will keep pushing to ensure we have a shot at that work.

As I write this report, I hope everyone is doing well. I have been talking to our fair contractors about upcoming work I have been told they are still actively bidding on work in my area. The work in my area that is coming up will be mostly Integrity Maintenance. The work should start in the spring, around April. Some projects in my area have yet to be awarded.

On another note, the American Pipeline Contractors Association (APCA) also has an advocacy network. (Troy Construction is a big one with the APCA.) They recently sent an action strongly objecting to government-mandated project labor agreements (PLAs). They said it would slow pipeline infrastructure projects, increase costs to taxpayers, and result in fewer buildouts of crucial energy infrastructure projects. This is what the nonunion is doing. To be clear, the APCA promotes the nonunion sector. The Pipeline Contractors Association (PLCA) promotes union pipeline contractors. That should tell you we need more participation in our Action Network. Get involved, stay involved. United we bargain, divided we beg. I was in a Zoom meeting with Navigator Heartland Greenway and some of the other crafts, and they asked if we could get signatures to support this project. So, some actions will soon be on the Action Network for Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, and South Dakota. Be sure to sign these petitions.

I have still been talking to and meeting with other UA locals. More UA work will be coming up around St. Louis, Memphis, Omaha, and Kansas City. Our Training Center is working with members to get UA certs every day.

In closing, I want to remind you about Steward School coming up in April. If you plan on working as a welder foreman, pipe man, or steward, make plans to attend. If I can be of any assistance to you, do not hesitate to call me.

The work in the Northeast is slow, but I hear a larger volume of work is currently being bid by our fair contractors. I've been telling members that I'm encouraged to hear this news, but the puzzle hasn't started to come together at this time. Hopefully, we will continue to see work in the Integrity Maintenance, compressor/meter station, gathering, and building trades sectors this year as we did in 2022. Large projects such as EQT's Mountain Valley Pipeline and Williams' Regional Energy Access are still in play for 2023 but still face regulatory challenges.

The REA consists of 22 miles of 30" in Luzerne County, Pennsylvania, 13.8 miles of 42" in Monroe County, Pennsylvania, plus numerous facility modifications in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. REA recently received their FERC Certification and has asked FERC to lift 30 days of their stay so they can possibly begin right-of-way clearing activities. If the stay is lifted and trees are cut, there's a possibility we might see some 2023 work on REA. Stay tuned for news on this project, as we should hear something from FERC by mid-February.

I want to update everyone who signed the Local 798 Action Network's MVP/U.S. Forest Service/Bureau of Land Management petition. We had a goal of 2,000 signatures, and we surpassed that by turning in 2,270 signatures to the agencies on February 6, 2023. It will be interesting to see the agencies use the signatures to show the Fourth Circuit that actual livelihoods and families are involved here and that their decisions greatly affect us. There is still a large appetite for permitting reform in Congress. I'd like to see that take place in case the Fourth Circuit doesn't agree with the agencies' recommendations and to finally expedite our existing antiquated permitting process. I am thankful to those who stepped up and let their voice be heard in the latest round of the fight that has become the MVP.

Steward School will be here soon, and I look forward to seeing everyone. This annual event is educational and will be beneficial personally and professionally. If you're still undecided about attending Steward School, I would like to pass along some advice given to me by members of a previous generation, "You can't afford **not** to attend."

I am writing this report while attending the UA Organizing Conference in Orlando, Florida. The UA and Local 798 are committed to increasing our market share around the country. We are focused on these low-density areas to create opportunities for you. The meetings with the gas companies have been promising as we promote Quality and Quantity to them. Two gas companies have recently visited the Training Center, and we have invitations out to others. These meetings have opened opportunities for our signatory contractors to be considered in areas where we have been excluded. This includes not only Mainline but also smaller Midstream and G&P projects. We want to commend the contractors that have committed to getting back into this smaller work that was left aside during the boom.

As you know, it takes three parts for us to get work – a gas company, a contractor, and the unions. The gas company has an approved project, the contractor is awarded the project, and the unions supply skilled labor. The only one that we can control

is the last - skilled labor. We are the best Welders, Journeymen, and Helpers in the world, so let's show these gas companies and our contractors that we are the hest

"What can I do to help my great local union?"

Get involved with your local union, get involved with your organizers, and make sure your skills are at the best levels. When the opportunity for work arises, make sure you are the best Welder, Journeyman, or Helper you can be. If you have some skills that need to be brushed up, utilize your Training Center, or reach out to fellow members that live close to you. If you know of a Brother or Sister needing help with their skill set, HELP THEM. That is what we should do! Treat others as you want to be treated. We all want each other to be the best that we can be!

Stay involved with the Action Network. The Action Network is a vital bargaining tool when dealing with gas companies. We have been able to get our signatory contractors the ability to bid on work in the South and West because of your involvement in the Action Network. These seeds are starting to bear fruit. Don't let up on your efforts. Get your family and friends to sign these actions also. If all our members signed these actions and got three family members to sign, we would have over 24,000 signatures. And if you don't believe in this approach, the nonunion contractors association (APCA) has its own Action Network with petitions to lower wages and remove PLAs. We need your support to make our voices heard.

Use the information that your local union is providing. The Blue Light has a lot of information in these reports that can keep the membership informed. The Dispatch office has released videos via email with good building trades job opportunities. We have received feedback that the members don't read the Blue Light or watch the videos. Make sure to encourage your Brothers and Sisters to read their emails. There was an email sent out on February 7 from the Organizing Department. If you missed it, I suggest that you find it. The email talks about a COMET class that will be taught by the UA Organizers at Steward School and other opportunities to get involved. We need your help with our organizing efforts. At nearly 6,500 strong, we can make a big difference by pulling in the same direction. If you see something, say something to your organizers or business agents. If you are interested in salting, call an organizer or BA. You are the eyes and ears in the field. Working together, we can accomplish anything. Continue to support your local union.

Good morning, Danny -

We are sending a quick note to let you know that the proposed CO2 pipeline projects serving ethanol refineries in the upper Midwest achieved an important win in South Dakota this week.

By a South Dakota Senate committee vote of 9-0, a bill failed that would otherwise have precluded use of eminent domain to secure the right of way, making it very difficult for the projects to move forward. Opponents know this and are making eminent domain the primary wedge issue to stop these projects.

A major factor in the bill's defeat was the hundreds of letters sent by EEIA members and affiliates to South Dakota senators. Please accept our sincere thanks to Local 798 and so many of your members who answered the call and came through in a big way. Hundreds of 798 Pipeliners sent letters to South Dakota Senators in the past week and had a big hand in helping secure a win for the CO2 pipeline projects serving ethanol refineries.

Opponents will no doubt redouble their efforts to kill the projects by mounting similar campaigns in other states, notably Iowa. EEIA will keep close watch and sound the alarm when help is needed again as the permitting process moves forward.

It's critical that these ethanol-based projects succeed. They are the first-movers in what studies suggest could be a 70,000-mile network of pipelines needed over the next fifteen years to transport CO2 to storage and move the needle on lowering greenhouse gas emissions. Opponents are adamantly against carbon capture and storage (CCS) projects because that are afraid they will enable continued use of natural gas and liquid fuels (including ethanol).

EEIA is engaging on another front in this battle about which you'll hear more from us shortly: federal permitting of the underground storage wells needed to receive and permanently sequester CO2. Opponents are lobbying the EPA, which has permitting authority, to slow-walk and deny Class VI CO2 storage well permit applications which are now severely backlogged. Without the wells there can be no pipelines.

We'll keep you up to date on these issues and let you know when help is needed to weigh in with support.

Clarification of Normal Retirement Age Modification

As communicated in the Summary of Material Modifications distributed in December 2022, the recent change to the Normal Retirement Age only impacts the age for taking a normal retirement. The age for Normal Retirement for participants whose first hour of service is on or after January 1, 2013, was previously age 67. This is what was changed to age 65. The age in place for an early retirement remains intact. Once vested, a participant can retire at age 55 with a reduced benefit (or age 57 for participants whose first hour of service is on or after January 1, 2013). Once vested, a participant can retire at age 60 with an unreduced benefit (or age 62 for participants whose first hour of service is on or after January 1, 2013). A reduction of 0.5% is taken for each month in advance of age 60/62. Therefore, a 30% reduction in the gross pension would be in effect if a participant retired at age 55/57. There is no reduction for retirement after age 60/62.

Member Portal Login Changes

Your login to the PIBF Member Portal will be changing soon. The login will no longer be based on your Blue Cross Blue Shield 803 identification number but will use an email address. The reason for this change is to allow adult dependents to be able to create their own Member Portal accounts and view their Health and Welfare claims. Adult dependents will be able to view their claims only. Once participants set up their new account, they will still be able to view adult dependents' Explanation of Benefits (EOB) but only the claim number, the dependent's name, member balance, and an indicator if the claim has been submitted for Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA). Please note that participants will not be able to view adult dependents' private health information on the EOB, such as procedure codes. Only the information needed to submit an HRA claim will be viewable.

For security purposes, the portal will require a secondary form of authentication, also known as Dual Factor or Multi-Factor Authentication, which will help keep your private information secure. Please note that due to these changes, PIBF IT Staff will no longer be able to reset passwords as this feature is now part of the new Member Portal. Be sure to save your password and security questions in a secure place.

New Pension Tax Table Installed

Pension tax tables are updated in the first quarter of each year. The new federal tax table for 2023 is scheduled to be installed and in effect on March 1, 2023. Please review your deposit amount as of that date and after and let us know if you need to make any changes. Oklahoma and Arkansas state tax tables will also be updated effective March 1, 2023.

Annual Pension Statements

Annual Pension statements are scheduled to be mailed to participants in March. Please verify pension hours worked for the current year and check the beginning year showing on your statement. This is especially important for older years to make sure your pension statement is complete.

Quarterly 401(k) Statements

Statements from the Trust Company of Oklahoma are mailed quarterly. When you receive your statement, it is important to verify that your 401(k) contributions, including Employee and Employer contributions (QNEC), are properly included.


The HRA deadline is fast approaching for 2022 claims. Don't leave money on the table! Remember to file for reimbursement of your 2022 claims by April 15, 2023.

PIBF continues to offer these screenings because the tests being offered are detecting medical problems, which, left unattended, could lead to more serious health issues. A form to sign up for an appointment is in the Steward School packet. During Steward School, please arrive at your designated appointment time. If you arrive earlier than your appointment, those with appointments scheduled prior to your appointment will be seen before you, even if they arrive after you do. Walk-ins will not be seen until scheduled appointments are complete. In years past, walk-ins were seen after lunch.






