

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# Financial Secretary -Treasurer's Report

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As I reflect on 2023, there were a lot of things that fell in our favor. Once the hours are all in, we will have worked 5 million man-hours. We made a lot of progress with some client gas companies that haven't been as receptive to union contractors in the past. We've taken in around 250 new Helper members through our organizing efforts; many were brought straight off a job working for nonunion contractors. We were able to man our work and simultaneously show these workers that there is a better way. As a result, the wages for Helpers in places like Texas and Louisiana have increased since last spring. This helps our union contractors be more successful in these areas. There were 400 "nonbook" Helpers sent out this year. Of those, 250 became members, and many are still in the process of becoming members of Local 798. Thank you to Chad and his team for staying the course. Organizing is not an easy job, but with every action they take, their results help move the needle in the right direction.

I want to ask each of you to continue advocating through the Action Network. It is essential for the future of our industry. Also, thank you to everyone who showed up in person to advocate for Local 798 when asked over the last year. The battle is long and will not get easier, so we've got to pull together and keep pushing back. The same opponents railing against natural gas and crude lines are also against Hydrogen, CO2, and LNG projects. It's not about reducing the impact of carbon emissions for them; it's about stopping any pipeline project in this country. Let's not let them continue to take food off our tables. Let's be louder than they are; let's be more organized than they are.

The Funds at PIBF continue to be in good shape. The Health and Welfare Fund has started to build more reserves than in recent years. The Pension Fund is in great condition, and the retirees were able to collect a 13th check. Hopefully, this year we will look at accrual increases for active members and a percentage increase for retirees. As trustees, we will continue making decisions that keep these funds solvent. I've said this before, but I will repeat it here. If you have any questions about your pension, healthcare, or 401(k), please call the PIBF. The employees at PIBF are there to work for you and can help you with any questions you might have.

Steward School is just around the corner, so look for that information to come out soon. All indications are that 2024 will look much like 2023 did regarding man-hours and work opportunities. From conversations with contractors and clients, everyone sees 2025 as a big year for us. As of the time of this writing, there are still over 1,100 Local 798 members working. That is a fantastic number for this time of year, so hopefully, this momentum will carry over to the new year. I want to welcome Joseph Bigley as our apprenticeship coordinator. Joe has a lot of experience with apprenticeships, and I know he will be an asset for Local 798. Welcome, Joe!

I am writing this report after returning from the regular December Membership Meeting. As always, it was great to see those who could attend.

The work in my area is still slow but is picking up slightly. I have pre-jobbed with Rockford to lay the drill sections on the 16" Suncor work. They are only utilizing a few Welders as they get permits and variances to proceed. I expect the Mainline to begin in late March or the beginning of April. If you plan on working on this project, be advised the test is scrutinized to b-3313 code. I have received job notifications on some smaller maintenance work and should continue to see more throughout the next year. I am also waiting to hear awards on some Mainline work in Nevada that could start early in the year. Q&D has already secured some fabrication work for that project, which should begin this winter. I have also been handling the calls to work in Alaska starting in January, I had hoped there was going to be enough work this winter to be able to send some Welders. However, it looks like Local Union 375 will be able to cover most of the Welder calls this year. I have been sending some Helper bios up, and several should get an opportunity to go. If you have talked to me and are on the list, I plan on carrying that list forward through next year. I believe when the Willow Project and others get going, I may be able to start sending Welder and Journeyman bios. Some building trades locals out West still have work available as well. Phoenix will still take Helpers who have the required UA certifications. If you are a Helper, we will not send your bio if you do not have certifications.

At the time of this report, I have just returned from Tulsa to attend our regular December Membership Meeting. It was great to see those who made the trip. The meeting went well. We had around 114 members in attendance. The evening agenda focused on our finances, work outlook, and the apprenticeship program. Our finances are healthy, and PIBF (our insurance) had almost a 28% YTD increase, which indicates that the money from our raises allocated towards our insurance and COBRA increases were necessary and are delivering positive results. Brother Hendrix addressed the work outlook for 2024, with projections looking favorable and 2025 being even better. He also spoke about our new Local 798 Apprenticeship Program. It is still a work in progress, but we are making strides towards a certified apprenticeship program sometime in March. Congratulations to Brother Joseph Bigley, who has been appointed as our new apprenticeship coordinator. Brother Bigley brings valuable experience and union loyalty to this new venture.

We still have over 1,100 members working on NPLA projects, which is encouraging since we typically see a decrease in activity this time of year. There are 20 active jobs in my area that have been ongoing but are in the stages of wrapping up for the winter. Again, building trades hours are available for Welders and Journeymen who want to work. As far as openings for Helpers in the building trades, if you do not have the necessary UA welding certifications, hiring is strictly by name call. In other words, the contractor must specifically ask for you by name.

In early December, the Michigan Public Service Commission approved the Enbridge application to build the Line 5 Tunnel Project. This was an important step in the approval process. Next is the federal review from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Please continue to use the Action Network for projects like Line 5. This platform is the best tool that provides and encourages active participation in our union's livelihood and our nation's future.

Happy New Year to all my Brothers and Sisters. Thank you for your union solidarity in 2023 by attending regular membership and regional meetings, engaging in the Action Network, and manning our work according to the NPLA. Your monthly dues, Voluntary Fund, and working assessments paid for 2023 are available to you on the Member Login section of the Local 798 website. Once signed in, click on the payment history page, and enter any year to view the total amount of monies paid during that time. To view your working assessments and organizing fees paid, go to the work hour page, and enter the date range you need; it will give you the totals for that time frame. Please remember hours are typically reported 30-45 days behind, so if you worked in December, those working assessments will not appear until late January to mid-February 2024.

Your emailed year-end statements will not be available until after February 19, 2024. If you do not have an email address on file, your year-end statements will be mailed to your home address. We will be working diligently to get this information out to all members, so we will be unable to provide the information over the phone prior to that date. However, you may obtain this information when logged into the Member Login section of the website, as indicated above. Please keep in mind, our goal is to provide the membership with all the information they need while striving to do so in the most cost-efficient ways possible.

We would like to wish everyone a happy new year. We ask everyone to make sure all your pertinent information is up to date with Local Union 798 and PIBF.


We have had a steady flow of building trades work. If you are a Welder or Journeyman looking to start the year off accumulating some man-hours, we

encourage you to call and see if we can help put you on a building trades job. It's better to plan now than call next December, needing a few more hours to get a credit year. There is a big demand for combo Welders with current UA certificates. These jobs are in multiple areas, so the pay scales do vary. Major projects from battery plants, refineries, and chip plants are steadily manning up through the winter months. If you are a combo Welder and are interested in starting the year off working, call us. The fitter work has been sporadic, but it never hurts to call and see what's out there.

If you do not have your OSHA 10, we highly recommend you get it through the 798 Training Center. The winter months are the perfect time to take the course. Farron Hollabaugh, the training center director, can help you with the OSHA 10. This time of the year is also a great time to work on your skill set in general. The training center is wide open. If you're considering a building trades job or want to hone your low-hydrogen skills, now is a great opportunity.

The pipeline work outlook is positive. We are hearing rumors of upcoming work but nothing in writing. Remember, if you receive something from the Action Network, please sign it.

# ORGANIZING Report

The December meeting has just wrapped up, and it was great to see all who attended. It is always great to have first-timers at the meeting. Remember to invite our newly organized members. One big announcement was Joe Bigley's appointment as apprenticeship coordinator. Congratulations Joe! He is an excellent fit for this position.

As the holiday season closes, the new year is upon us, and we are excited about what it holds. First, let's look at a few of the accomplishments for 2023. Our man-hours were up to 5 million, with over 1,100 members working on NPLA jobs into December. Many of these man-hours resulted from your advocacy through our Action Network. Although complicated, the building of the project is the easy part nowadays. Our collective voice plays a significant role in permit approvals. Please continue to support the Action Network. Our contractors secured work for new gas companies, and you knocked it out of the park, finishing ahead of schedule with low repair rates, only solidifying that you are the greatest pipeliners in the world.

As the work picked up throughout the year, the Organizing Department was able to work with your business agents and PPC11 390 Helpers. Some were your sons, daughters, grandchildren, etc., but over 50% were from the nonunion sector. Local 798 gained good Helpers who understand the industry and are now compensated fairly for their labor. These new Helpers often receive a \$5–\$15 hourly wage increase plus our retirement and health care benefits. We also had the opportunity to bring in five new Welders to help man our work. These new members provided the manpower our signatory contractors needed to complete their projects. Let's make them welcome when we get a chance. Throughout 2023, we engaged with over 2,000 nonunion Welders and Helpers. We plan to continue filling open positions with these quality candidates as our market share increases and members retire.

Our goal is for every Welder, Journeyman, and Helper to be compensated fairly for their skill sets. It doesn't matter whether they are union or nonunion; pipeliners need to be paid what they are worth today. The pipeline Welder can be described as a metal fusion expert with nomadic tendencies. Welders load up in their rigs and travel nationwide to build America's much-needed pipelines. You craftsmen perform as an artist, displaying your unique ability to weld in some of the most adverse conditions with precision and accuracy. These skills cannot be easily replicated as some jobs on the pipeline, and this ability needs to be paid accordingly. On the union side, we are fortunate to have a fair wage with great retirement and health care benefits. Why shouldn't the nonunion Welder and Helper have the same? If you know some nonunion Welders and Helpers, have them contact us. We want to help them make a better life for themselves and their families. As stated earlier, all pipeliners need to be paid their worth. If they want to become union or not, we want to help them make a better wage and have better working conditions. These merit shop contractors have taken advantage of the pipeline Welder for far too long. The pay continues to trend lower as profits continue to soar.

Here is the fact — They can't build a steel pipeline without qualified, skilled rig Welders. These nonunion contractors try to control the pipeline industry with their contractors' association. How ironic is it that the nonunion contractors have a union, the APCA, but tell the workers that they don't need a union? **THEY ARE WRONG. THE WELDERS CONTROL THE PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY!** And I bet most of the contractor representatives can't weld a lick! You must have Welders to build pipelines, and if the Welders stick together, they can change the pipeline world as we know it. All Welders, Journeymen, and Helpers can be paid fairly and receive the benefits they deserve. All it takes is unity!

Happy 60th Anniversary to Pipeline Industry Benefit Fund! It's hard to believe it's been 60 years! I will include historical facts about PIBF in each Blue Light article in 2024. Let's start at the very beginning...

The first meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Pipeline Industry Benefit Fund was held in the office of Williams Brothers Company, 326 National Bank of Tulsa Building, Tulsa, Oklahoma, beginning at 10 a.m., June 2, 1964. The following officers were elected to serve for the first year or until their successors had been elected and qualified in accordance with the trust agreement to be drafted at a later date: Chairman – George Seaton, Co-Chairman – B.E. Barnes, Secretary – W.H. Bryere.

On November 23, 1964, the Board of Trustees unanimously passed the following: "RESOLVED: That the headquarters office of the Pipeline Industry Benefit Fund be established in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and that suitable quarters be rented, separate and apart from the offices of Pipeliners Local Union 798."

## Diabetic and Weight Loss Medications

Advertisements for these medications are everywhere you look. As a result, PIBF/Sav-Rx is receiving numerous questions about eligibility for medications such as Ozempic, Mounjaro, Wegovy, etc. In some cases, participants will start taking these medications using samples or coupons at the pharmacy without first verifying coverage through PIBF. Once those coupons expire or samples are used, they have their doctor send in a prescription for the medication and are incredibly frustrated to find out that other steps must be

completed before coverage through PIBF prescription drug benefit can be considered or that it does not meet criteria for coverage through PIBF.

Sav-Rx follows the current guidelines set by the American Diabetes Association for approval of diabetic medications, which include a diagnosis of Type 2 diabetes and an A1c>6.5%. Coverage for diabetic GLP1 medications (Ozempic, Mounjaro, Trulicity, Rybelsus, Victoza) can only be approved for participants meeting those criteria and after trying and failing one generic medication, such as metformin or pioglitazone, and one non-GLP1 brand name medication, such as Januvia or Jardiance. Modifications to these criteria are in place if you have other underlying conditions such as atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease, chronic kidney disease, or heart failure.

Sav-Rx follows PIBF plan guidelines for approval of weight loss medications, which include a Body Mass Index of 35 or over with co-morbidities such as prediabetes, diabetes, high blood pressure, sleep apnea, lower extremity joint pain, and shortness of breath. Participation in a physician-supervised diet program, as documented in medical records, is required. Continued use of weight loss medications requires periodic documentation of progress with documented weight loss. There are several oral weight loss medications, such as phentermine, Contrave, Qsymia, in addition to the injectable GLP-1 weight loss medications, Saxenda, Wegovy, and Zepbound.

Please make sure you clearly understand the steps that must be taken prior to approval for these medications.

### Member Portal Verification Code

The member portal has been upgraded so that participants can now utilize a text message to confirm their identity (dual authentication) when logging into the site. To set this up, you will need to log into the portal using your email address and password. That ensures that PIBF has accurate email addresses in case the Fund ever needs to email you. Once logged in, you can update your cell phone by clicking "Account Settings" in the menu on the left side of the site. Once the Account Settings appear, click "Edit" on the "Mobile Phone" line. After reading the instructions, click the "Edit" button, enter your phone number, and click the "Verify Phone" button. Once you receive the 6-digit code on your phone, enter it into the box labeled, "Verify Code." Then, you must enter your password to ensure you intend to use this phone number. Going forward, you will still use your email address and password to log into the site initially, but you can start using text messages as dual authentication to confirm your identity. The option to verify your identity using your email address is still available as well.

## Sapphire Member Rewards — LIVE!

You will soon receive information in the mail explaining how to utilize Member Rewards. This program will allow you to compare providers for eligible procedures and earn a cash reward based on your savings by choosing an equally qualified but less expensive provider. We are extremely excited to launch this program and hope you find it beneficial!

### Tax Forms Available on Member Portal

Tax forms 1099-R (Pension Payments) will be mailed to you by the end of January, and 1095-B (Health Coverage) will be mailed to you by March 4, 2024. These forms are also available on the member portal at www.pibf.org. Log in and click on the "General Information" tab and then "Fund Office Correspondence." A list of correspondence will be displayed, and you can select and print the forms.

### Email Addresses and Other Personal Information

To remain HIPAA compliant, PIBF and Local 798 do not share change of address information. It is extremely important that plan participants notify both 798 and PIBF when permanent address changes occur or when email or telephone numbers change. You can change your address by mail, by calling the Fund office at 918-280-4800, or by going online to www.pibf.org, logging in to the "Members Login" section, and choosing "Change of Address Form" under the "Forms" tab.

## Deductibles Renew January 1st

Please remember that medical and prescription deductibles start over at the beginning of the year. The PIBF office receives a large volume of calls early in the year, questioning the price increase from their last refill. In most cases, this is due to the deductible having to be met before the prescription is covered with coinsurance. Sav-Rx is available 24/7 to answer questions related to the processing of your prescription claim.

## Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA)

The HRA deadline is fast approaching for 2023 claims. Don't leave money on the table! Remember to file for reimbursement of your 2023 claims by April 15, 2024.

# Summary of Benefits and Coverage

The PIBF office recently mailed out the Summary of Benefits and Coverage, describing what the benefit plan covers and what it costs. This condensed version of our PIBF Summary Plan Description booklet shows comparable information about your health plan benefits and coverage.
