

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The pipeline industry continues to gain momentum. It has been a very wet spring and has caused a few delays, but we all know that summer is coming, and the pipeline work soon will be making up for lost time. We have some great projects on the books for this season and beyond. The messaging from the White House is very positive for the pipeline industry. Organizing is on full display, our Action Network is recognized as a cutting-edge tool for advocacy, our apprenticeship program is nearing its debut, and your union is positioned to gain more market share.

The four crafts of this industry recently met with one of our largest clients over concerns about the availability of personnel for their projects. Many of the projects they have planned and budgeted will be earmarked for union contractors only, as they see the shortcomings of using nonunion contractors that don't provide training, healthcare, or pensions for their workforce. When you eliminate the benefits for workers and work for sub-standard wages, you eventually dilute the number of people who will work in that segment of the industry. The clients see and understand this as a negative trend for a strong, talented workforce they will need for the future.

As I approach my retirement years, I can't even imagine a nonunion Welder at 65 being able to retire with financial stability and dignity without having a defined benefit plan and access to affordable healthcare, as we all enjoy. I'm sure the owners of the nonunion contractors have and will enjoy a retirement plan for themselves, but the workers will not. Everyone working in the pipeline industry deserves healthcare, a pension, and a contract agreement that both contractors and workers adhere to. If you know someone from the nonunion side, reach out to them with respect and empathy; they are being victimized by unscrupulous contractors. They need to be educated and organized.

It is our duty. As always, I am proud to say, ***"I work for you, the greatest pipeliners in the world."***

FINANCIAL SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I hope this report finds you well. The work season is upon us, as we currently have around 120 NPLA jobs underway. At the time of this writing, the jobs for Price Gregory in Oak Grove, Louisiana, and Associated in Leesville, Louisiana, will be manning soon. We are definitely gaining ground in Louisiana. We also have indications that our fair contractors have a couple of big projects in Texas to start later this summer. Through May, we have worked 1.7 million man-hours, which is a good start to the year. We also hear that Enbridge's Ridgeline Project will move forward this fall. This is a large project in Tennessee that will be built 100% union. In addition to these larger projects, the Integrity Maintenance work is picking up steam throughout our jurisdiction.

Danny and I have traveled a lot over the last several months, meeting with the PLCA, contractor representatives, and gas company representatives. Along with the UA Pipeline Department and the other pipeline crafts, we have secured a decent amount of work for the next few years. All signs indicate union pipeline work will be strong over the next four or five years. Looking to the future, training and organizing is what will keep us in the driver's seat. The process of building an apprenticeship program is still moving forward. We are getting closer all the time. Again, I want to commend everyone involved in moving this initiative forward. Through this apprenticeship program, I truly believe we will produce the most well-rounded Journeymen and Welders in the industry.

On June 2, the negotiated raises in the National Pipeline Agreement took effect. The Journeyman/Welder increase for high scale was \$2.00. The allocation for this \$2.00 increase is \$0.45 to the training center and \$1.55 added to the wage. The idea behind this was to add money to the training fund to help offset costs associated with building the apprenticeship program and put as much money in the members' pockets as possible. I want to explain that although some might have preferred the increase go to per diem, the problem is that the Welder per diem at \$165 daily is close to the IRS allowable max in certain regions. The Helper increase for high scale was \$1.50. The allocation for this \$1.50 increase is \$0.45 to the training center and \$1.05 to the per diem. This puts the Helper per diem at an even \$100 for high-scale work. On 90 percent scale jobs, the Helper per diem is \$99, and on 80 percent jobs, the Helper per diem is \$96. We have wanted to see that Helper per diem at \$100 for a while now, and I believe this was the right move at the right time.

We still have plenty of applicants wanting to join Local 798 as opportunities arise. We've already taken in several new Helpers this year, and I expect that will continue throughout this work season. We pull right from the applicant list to fill those unfilled Helper positions. Every current Local 798 Helper gets the first chance at any job, but once it goes unfilled, we send applicants out to have the OPPORTUNITY to become a member of this great local union. That means we provide the opportunity, but the applicant must be teachable and have a strong work ethic.

As with anything, some will work out, while others do not. It is our responsibility to make these potential members feel welcome. Every member of this local union got their start somewhere. If you are a prospective member reading this, please remember, if given that OPPORTUNITY, don't squander it. Show up drug-free, on time, ready and willing to learn the job, and work hard. Do this, and the sky is the limit for where this industry might take you. Pipeliners Local Union 798 still believes in the old saying, "If you can't get it, you can't stay!" We are only interested in individuals who will strengthen this local union, and with literally thousands of Helper applicants, we will only settle for those who do just that. This goes for all members, but especially our new members of Local 798.

If you have questions about your pension, healthcare, or 401(k), please call PIBF. This is your Fund office, which is staffed with experts in each of these areas. Don't ask other members and definitely don't ask Facebook. Your pension and healthcare are too important not to get the facts. The Fund staff members are there to help you, so please let them.

If there is anything I can help you with, please don't hesitate to call me. **As always, I am proud to serve the membership of Pipeliners Local Union 798!**

The Precision work in Nevada will be kicking off shortly, starting with the fabrication of the two meter stations, and I believe they will be kicking off the Mainline toward the middle of July. I still have some smaller jobs starting after the 4th of July holiday, but I do not anticipate much hitting the job line. I encourage all of you to stay active on the Action Network. There is another large project coming up in Colorado that I am certain we will be asked to help advocate for. I cannot give details at this time, but we should have more information soon.

I hope this finds you all doing well. Over the past few weeks, I've traveled through Nebraska and the Dakotas, and I'll be heading to Minnesota in the coming weeks for additional job visits. The workload in my area has increased significantly, with 35 open pre-jobs currently. We have numerous Tallgrass projects underway, ranging from 4-inch to 16-inch pipelines and several station projects. As I write this report, Justin Head and I are attending a Tallgrass event in Colorado. We met with the state and local public affairs manager, and he mentioned that while he was visiting, he encountered some of our members at a local restaurant. He said they were very professional, even off the job. Just a reminder: This is the kind of publicity we want when we work in different communities. Be professional both on and off the job.

During my recent visit to North Dakota, there was widespread drilling activity, and I was informed that such operations are expected to continue for the next five to ten years. We are finally receiving a substantial amount of Northern Natural Integrity Maintenance work. These are relatively small jobs requiring one to six Welders and involve low-hydrogen welding with multiple tests. If you need to brush up on your low-hydrogen welding skills, I encourage you to reach out to the training center.

While visiting job sites in Minnesota over the next few weeks, I will also attend the Minnesota Pipe Trades Conference. I will continue maintaining positive relationships with the local unions on the building trades side. I have received a few calls from these locals regarding the need for Welders with a UA-21 certification.

Our organizers are working hard, so if you encounter any nonunion job sites, please notify an organizer or the BA in that area.

Lastly, don't forget about the Action Network. Although it is a busy time of year, I encourage you to take a moment to sign your name in

support of these actions and to inform your family and friends that they can also participate.

I am writing this report after spending a stretch on the road with fellow Business Agent Joseph Torres. We have been making rounds in the Central Region conducting job visits along with contractor personnel introductions. Our time on the ROW visiting with members and answering questions is always a highlight. Currently, I have Joseph overseeing all new applicants. The work outlook in this region has not changed much since my last report. Two Enbridge jobs are worth mentioning since they have been topics of conversation. We anticipate a signed PLA this summer (hopefully by the time of this reading) for the Enbridge Ridgeline Project. They are still projecting a fall 2025 start. Also, the United States Army Corp of Engineers (USACOE) released a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for Enbridge's Line 5 Great Lakes Tunnel Project in Michigan.

The USACOE recently had a call to action in June for public feedback pertaining to the DEIS. The long-term benefits of the much-needed Line 5 drastically outweigh the short-term and manageable disruption to the environment in the construction area. The Line 5 Tunnel public meeting and comment period was an essential step in the review process after more than five years of rigorous and comprehensive work by the United States Army Corp of Engineers. The DEIS release was a significant milestone in the development of the Great Lakes Tunnel. Thank you to all who submitted written comments and attended the virtual public meetings. Please go to our Action Network to sign and submit your support for all our pending projects.

NOMINATIONS

1. A meeting to nominate candidates for officers and UA Convention Delegates/Alternates will be held on Friday, September 12, 2025, starting at 7 p.m. CST, at the Local 798 Union Hall, 4823 S. 83rd E. Ave., Tulsa, OK 74145.
2. Nominations will be accepted for the following offices:

President

Vice President

Recording Secretary

Business Manager

Financial Secretary-Treasurer

Inside Guard

Executive Board (4 Positions)

Finance Committee (3 Positions)

Examining Board (2 Positions)

3. No member shall run for more than one office. The term of office shall be in accordance with the United Association Constitution.
4. No Local 798 member shall be eligible to be nominated for office in Local 798 unless they have been a member in good standing of the United Association and Local 798 for at least a period of two (2) years immediately prior to the election. Any member who owes or has paid a reinstatement fee within a period of two (2) years immediately prior to the date of the election shall not be eligible to be nominated for office in Local 798. The "date of the election" for purposes of determining eligibility to run for office is October 29, 2025. Thus, if a member is not eligible as described above as of October 29, 2025, they will not be eligible to run for office.
5. Nominations will also be accepted for convention delegates for the upcoming 2026 UA General Convention. No Local 798 member shall be eligible as a delegate or alternate unless he has been a good standing member of the Local Union which he is to represent for at least two (2) continuous years previous to his election and he remains in good standing from the date of his election through the period of the convention. The date of the "election" for purposes of determining eligibility to serve as a convention delegate or alternate is October 29, 2025. Thus, if a member is not eligible as described above as of October 29, 2025, he will not be eligible to run for convention delegate or alternate.
6. Nominations for officers and convention delegates will be accepted from the floor at the nominations meeting. A candidate may nominate themselves and need not have a second. If a member is not present at the meeting, they may be nominated or nominate themselves by sending a written notice of their acceptance of nomination to the specified office. Such written notice may be delivered by hand, mail, or facsimile to the Union Office or by email to nominations@local798.org. Written notice must be received by the Local 798 Union Hall in Tulsa, Oklahoma, no later than 4:30 p.m. CST on the day of nominations, Friday, September 12, 2025. (Please note that the email address for nominations will be activated on June 30, 2025, and deactivated at 4:30 p.m. CST on Friday, September 12, 2025.) The names of all candidates received by this deadline will be announced at the nominations meeting.
7. Under Section 504 of the Labor Management Reporting and Disclosure Act ("LMRDA"), a member who has been convicted of certain crimes may not hold union office for a maximum of 13 years following the date of conviction or the end of imprisonment, whichever is later. Please call the U.S. Department of Labor or the Chairman of the Election Committee if you have a question about this provision of the LMRDA.
8. The Election Committee will conduct a candidate meeting on Saturday, September 13, 2025. All candidates and their observers are encouraged to attend. The meeting will be conducted at the Local 798 Union Hall, 4823 S. 83rd E. Ave., Tulsa, OK 74145, and will start at 10 a.m. CST.

MAIL BALLOT ELECTION

1. The General President has directed that the election for officers be conducted by mail ballot. There will be no manual balloting.
2. Election Source shall administer the election. Election Source is headquartered at 4615 Danvers Dr. SE, Grand Rapids, MI 49512. The Election Source representative conducting the Local 798 election is Steve Panoff. Election Source has advised that it will utilize the services of Pageworks. Pageworks is located at 2801 Oak Industrial Dr. NE, Grand Rapids, MI 49505.
3. Ballots will be mailed to all eligible Local 798 members on Wednesday, October 29, 2025, at their most recent permanent address on file with the Local Union ("primary address") as of Friday, October 24, 2025.
4. No Local 798 member shall be eligible to vote in the election unless they have been a member of the United Association and Local 798 in good standing for at least a period of one (1) year immediately prior to the date of the election. Any member who owes or has paid a reinstatement fee within a period of one (1) year immediately prior to the date of the election shall not be eligible to vote. The "date of the election" for purposes of determining eligibility to vote is October 29, 2025. Thus, if a member is not eligible as described above as of October 29, 2025, they will not be eligible to vote.
5. Members who do not receive a ballot or who need a "duplicate" ballot must contact Election Source directly at 888-742-8037. Thus, for example, if a member does not receive a ballot at the address provided to Local 798 or is no longer receiving mail at that address, they may request a duplicate ballot from Election Source. Members must call personally to obtain a duplicate ballot; they may not have another individual call for them. The member will be asked to provide identifying membership information (such as book number or social security number) to obtain a duplicate ballot. Election Source will provide the member with a confirmation number.
6. To be counted, ballots must be returned to the Tulsa, Oklahoma, U.S. post office box printed on the outer return envelope by 9 a.m. CST on Thursday, December 11, 2025. Any ballot that is returned to the post office later than this date and time will not be counted. Ballots will be counted on Thursday, December 11, 2025, at the Local 798 Union Hall, 4823 S. 83rd E. Ave., Tulsa, OK 74145, starting at 9:30 a.m. CST.
7. The results of the election will be announced at the Regular Membership Meeting on Friday, December 12, 2025, starting at 7 p.m. CST at the Local 798 Union Hall, 4823 S. 83rd E. Ave., Tulsa, OK 74145.
8. In the event there is a tie vote in an officer or convention delegates/alternates election, and a run-off election is necessary, a mail ballot election will be conducted for only those offices or convention delegates for which there is a tie vote. Ballots will be mailed on January 12, 2026, and will be counted on February 12, 2026, at the Local 798 Union Hall, 4823 S. 83rd E. Ave., Tulsa, OK, starting at 9:30 a.m. CST. The results of any run-off election will be announced at a Special Membership meeting to be held on February 13, 2026, at the Local 798 Union Hall, 4823 S. 83rd E. Ave., Tulsa, OK 74145, starting at 7 p.m. CST.

Officer Responsibilities

Taking on the role of a union officer is an important responsibility that requires dedication, leadership, and a clear understanding of your duties. Please review the brief descriptions below to help ensure you fully understand what each role entails. For the complete descriptions, refer to the [Local 798 Constitution and By-Laws](#).

PRESIDENT (1 Position)

The President presides at all meetings and enforces law and order in those meetings. The President is ex-officio over all committees.

VICE PRESIDENT (1 Position)

The Vice President is chairman and a voting member of the Executive Board. He shall assist the President in maintaining order during meetings and, in the absence of the President, will assume the chair.

RECORDING SECRETARY (1 Position)

The Recording Secretary maintains correct and intelligent records of the business transacted at the regular membership meetings and during the Executive Board meetings.

BUSINESS MANAGER (1 Position)

The Business Manager handles the daily affairs and business operations of the local union. The Business Manager is in constant contact with the members, employers, public, and is the trustee of the welfare of the members of the local union.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY-TREASURER (1 Position)

The Financial Secretary-Treasurer maintains a correct account of the financial standing of all members of the local union. The Financial Secretary-Treasurer is also responsible for paying all bills and for accounting for all monies received or disbursed by the local union.

INSIDE GUARD (1 Position)

The Inside Guard is responsible for maintaining order and security at both the Executive Board meetings and the regular membership meetings.

EXECUTIVE BOARD (4 Positions)

The Executive Board acts as a trial board for all internal union charges referred to trial. It is also empowered to transact business referred to it by the local union, or duties referred to it by the duly elected local union officers.

FINANCE COMMITTEE (3 Positions)

The Finance Committee examines the local's bank records and bank accounts and counts all money in the possession of the Financial Secretary-Treasurer.

EXAMINING BOARD (2 Positions)

The Examining Board reviews the membership records of new initiates, transfers, and classification changes approved by the Business Manager to ensure that all the qualification requirements have been met.

PIBF REPORT

WATCH FOR THESE SIGNS OF A HEATSTROKE

Summer is here, and we all must take precautions when working and spending time outside in warmer temperatures. The following is information from www.mayoclinic.org.

Heatstroke is a condition caused by the body overheating. This usually happens because of exposure to high temperatures or physical activity in high temperatures for too long. There are a few stages of heat injury, and heatstroke is the most serious. It can happen if body temperature rises to 104 F (40 C) or higher. Heatstroke is most common in the summer months.

Heatstroke needs emergency care. If it's not treated, heatstroke can quickly damage the brain, heart, kidneys, and muscles. This damage gets worse the longer treatment is delayed, which increases the risk of serious complications or death.

Heatstroke symptoms include:

- High body temperature - A core body temperature of 104 degrees Fahrenheit (40 degrees Celsius) or higher is the main sign of heatstroke.
- Change in mental state or behavior - Confusion, agitation, slurred speech, irritability, delirium, seizures, and coma can all result from heatstroke.
- Change in sweating pattern - In heatstroke brought on by hot weather, skin feels hot and dry to the touch. However, in heatstroke brought on by strenuous exercise, sweating may be profuse.
- Nausea and vomiting - Someone with heatstroke may feel sick to their stomach or vomit.
- Flushed skin - Skin may turn red as body temperature increases.
- Rapid breathing - Breathing may become rapid and shallow.
- Racing heart rate - Pulse may significantly increase because heat stress places an extreme burden on the heart to help cool the body.
- Headache - Heatstroke may cause the head to throb.

If you think a person may be experiencing heatstroke, seek immediate medical help. Call 911 or your local emergency services number. Take immediate action to cool the person with heatstroke while waiting for emergency treatment.

- Get the person into shade or indoors.
- Remove excess clothing.
- Cool the person with whatever means available — put in a cool tub of water or a cool shower, spray with a garden hose, sponge with cool water, fan while misting with cool water, or place ice packs or cold, wet towels on the person's head, neck, armpits and groin.






